QUESTIONNAIRE FOR STUDENTS TAKING THE MCAT, LSAT, USMLE, AND BAR EXAMS

Use as many pages as necessary to answer the following questions in detail. This level of documentation is required by the LSAC and the medical licensing board. Failure to provide full documentation will significantly reduce your chances of getting approved for test accommodations.

Please be sure to bring this document with you to your initial appointment, or mail or fax it ahead of time.

1. What learning problems do you have that may qualify you for accommodated testing? Be sure to include formal diagnoses as well as undiagnosed learning or processing problems.
2. Describe IN DETAIL the impact your learning problems have on academic skills such as reading, focus, concentration, memory, writing, math, test taking, note taking, etc. Be specific and give examples.
3. Describe in detail the interventions you received at each level in school, and indicate whether you had an IEP or 504 Plan. Include details of special education programs, private tutoring, and all accommodations. Be sure to describe any testing accommodations you received, and whether these were granted formally or informally.
4. Describe the impact of these problems on other major life activities such as work, household management, paying bills, socializing, driving, etc. Be specific and give examples. Have these problems been noticed by or had an impact on others in your life?
5. You must provide each of the following:
 - High school transcript
 - If available, grade reports from high school and junior high with teachers' comments.
 - Copies of IEPs or 504 Plans if applicable
 - Results of all standardized tests (SAT, ACT, GRE, MCAT, LSAT, USMLE, Bar exam etc.)
 - College transcript
 - Reports from all previous psychological and educational evaluations. If these have been done but the reports are not available, you must indicate the approximate date(s) the testing was performed, the name of the individual, clinic, or school district that performed the testing, and the findings, results, and diagnoses as you understand them.

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
